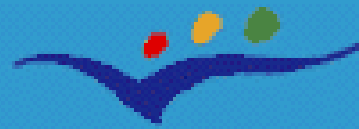

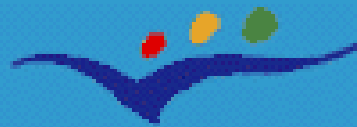
## About Tempus Programme

Tempus is a programme by the European Community aimed to **facilitate social and economical changes** in partner countries.

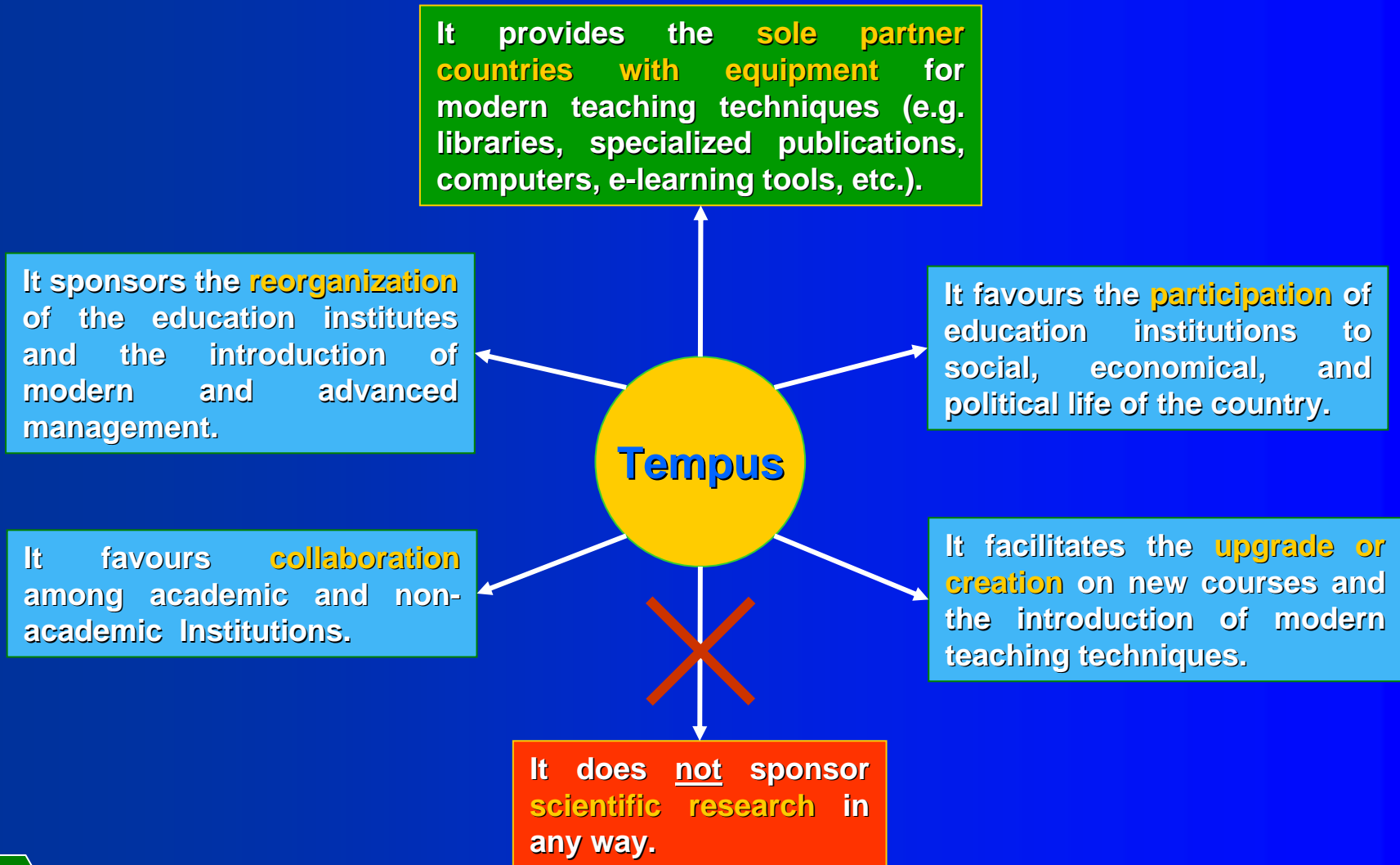
The Tempus programme intends to **upgrade superior educational systems** in those countries via a well-balanced collaboration among partner countries and member States of the European Community

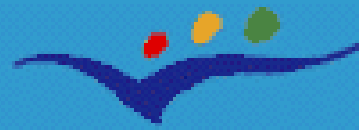
The programme is based on the concept that superior educational systems are **fundamental for economical and social transition processes and cultural progress**; those systems also represent a pool of technical knowledge and human resources necessary to the proper formation of the future generations of political leaders.

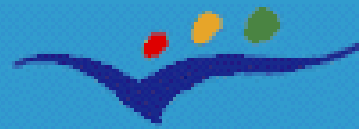


## The provisions of Tempus - 1 of 2

The Tempus Programme operates in three different ways:

- 1) providing **funds** under the form of **grants**;
- 2) favouring **collaboration** among institutes and countries;
- 3) facilitating **mobility** of scientific and educational staff and **know-how transfer** among member states and partner countries.





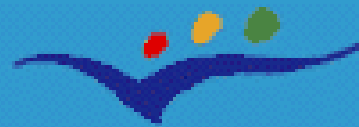
## The provisions of Tempus - 2 of 2

Two types of grant are available:

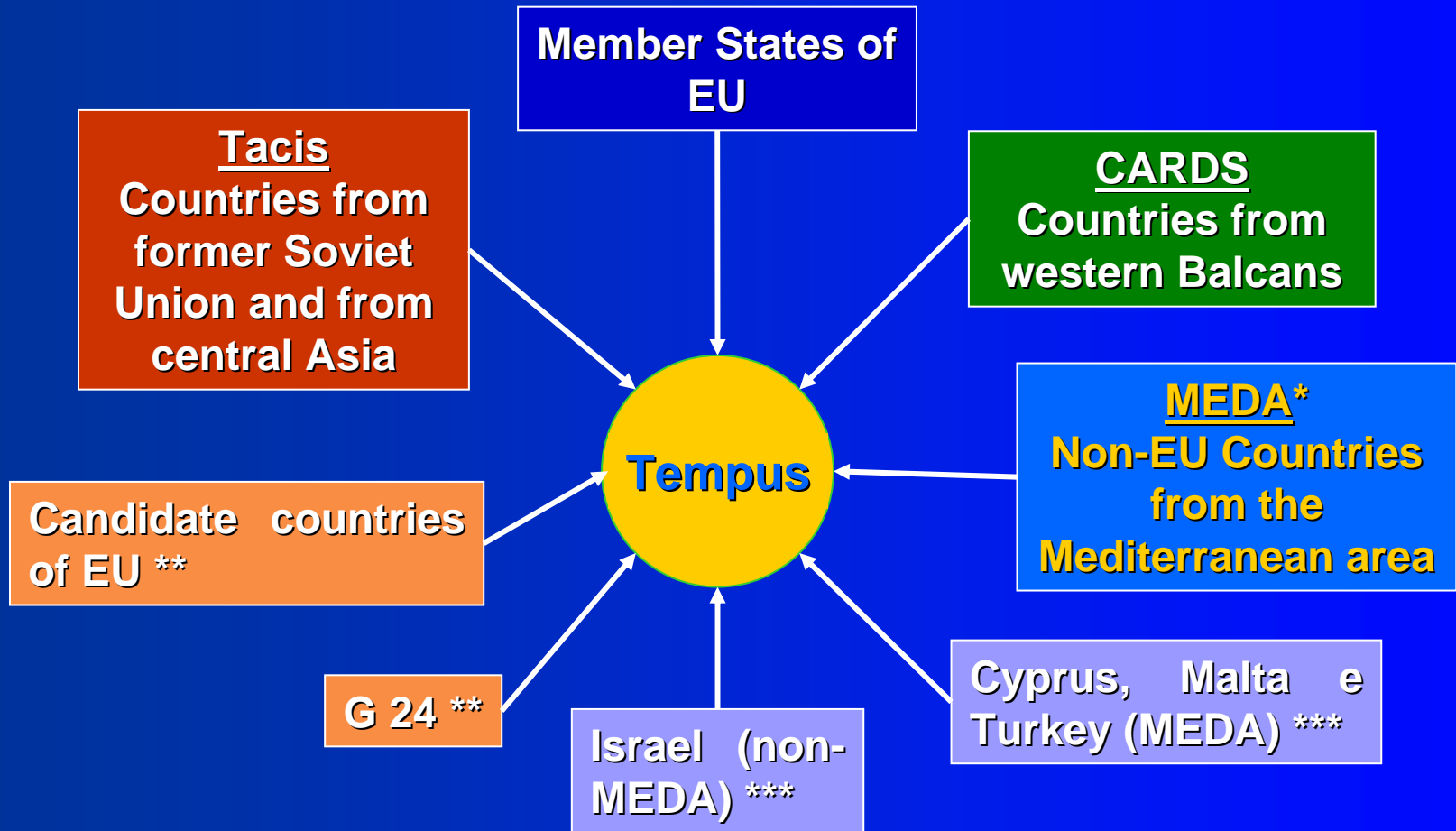
1) grants for university consortia (and/or other admitted participants) to collaborate to 2-3 years structured projects to reach well defined goals, the so called **Joint European Projects** (JEPs).

2) grants to individuals - e.g. professors, academic staff, functionaries and personnel of Ministries - to allow travels abroad in order to perform tasks clearly connected with a particular reform process. Those are the so called **Individual Mobility Grants**.





## The Countries admitted to Tempus

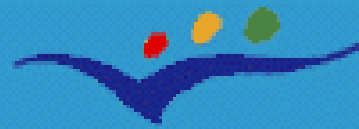

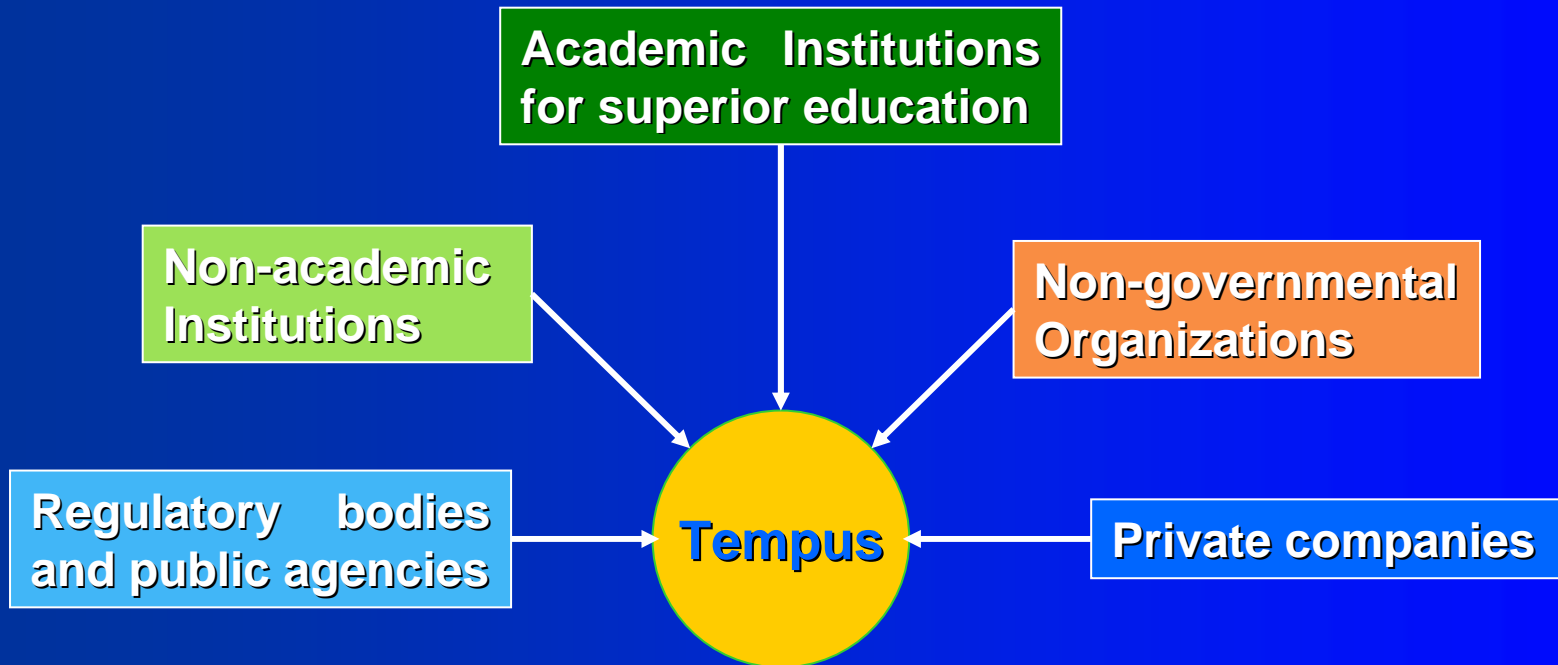

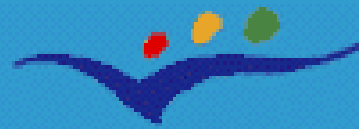


## The Organizations admitted to Tempus

## Eligible projects of Tempus

### Curriculum development projects.

They focus on topics and teaching methods in Partner Countries; they aim to create new courses or upgrade existing ones and to increase the know-how of the teaching staff.

### Training courses for Institution building.

They focus on the development of non-academic administrative and institutional structures via specific courses for upgrading and increasing capabilities of non-academic staff.

### Internet publication projects.

They focus on the dissemination of the results of successful Tempus projects for new applicants to benefit from past experiences.

Extension of already approved and terminated Tempus projects in order to better achieve the goals and to add new ones.

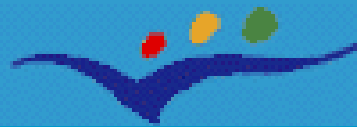
### University management projects.

They focus on restructuring management, organization, and administration of universities.

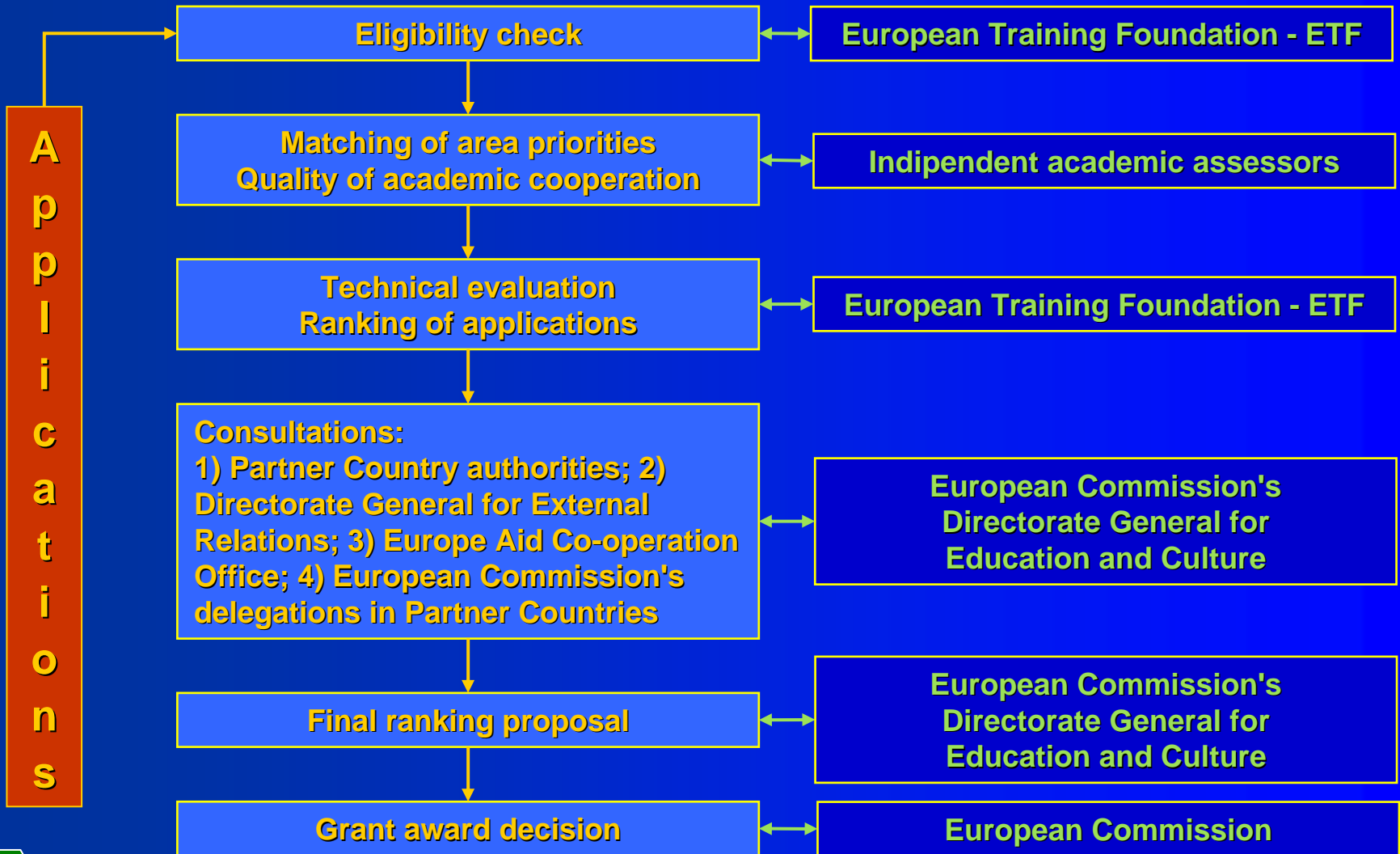
### Individual mobility grants.

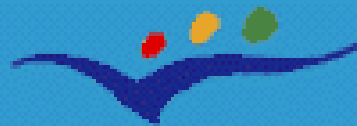
